But in times of national crisis in years past, or even routinely in our modern age for our key workers, many people are forced to be absent by circumstance, rather than choice. As we celebrate this great climax of the Christian year, what seems exceptional to us, others will be accustomed to. Let us pray that we might identify with our sisters and brothers, dispersed but gathered, as we remember once more the triumph of love over death.

Collect for Easter Day

Lord of all life and power, who through the mighty resurrection of your Son overcame the old order of sin and death to make all things new in him: grant that we, being dead to sin and alive to you in Jesus Christ, may reign with him in glory; to whom with you and the Holy Spirit be praise and honour, glory and might, now and in all eternity.



Resurrection

In his sermon today, the Archbishop of Canterbury will call for the 'resurrection of our common life'. This is good and helpful in so many ways. It is not a rallying to faith, though faith is involved. It is not a call to the reformation of structures or authority or scriptural compliance or strict orthodox observance. In many ways it is the most authentic of Christian callings – the common life. The solitary Christian is an anathema to our faith, those who plead 'I'm Christian, but don't see the need to go to church'. The primary understanding of the Christian faith is that of a way of life – rather than creedal adherence – and of gathering. One word for this is synagogue, and another is ekklesia. The first familiar to Judaism, and the second, from which the word 'church' comes, is familiar to Christians. Synagogue primarily means 'to gather', and ekklesia (think 'ecclesiastical') is 'to call out' or 'call together'.

To gather as a community is foundational to our way of practising our Christian faith, and not simply because we enjoy it, or even like it, but because it is good and necessary. Being together is how we work out our faith, and if that is not always easy and often challenging, then so much the better!

This Easter, the great challenge is that we are not able to gather. As someone said recently, 'We stay apart for now so that, when we do gather later, everyone is still with us'. It is hard, it is weird, for priest and people alike, it will be most strange, and I pray that we can truly lament this, mourn it and bewail, because only when something truly dies can it experience resurrection. The Archbishop's words are prophetic indeed: this Easter will be the more profound, not for what we can not do, but for what we shall become. Through this whole ordeal, let our common life be brought more truly to life. We are Easter People, and our home is to be together with the one we love; risen, ascended, glorified!!
