

An inspiration of the sea – a reflection by Mark Poole, Curate of the Benefice.

Now that our summer holiday in Cornwall seems like a distant memory, I enjoy recalling the breath-taking shades of turquoise, emerald and azure of the sea shimmering in the sunlight, and the thrill and exhilaration from being in the sea, despite its equally breath-taking temperature! I also remember just how dramatically different the sea can be from day to day. There were days where its mill pond calmness made swimming a doddle and, being game for most things, presented a challenge for my friend Paul and I to explore paddle boarding for the first time. This caused much hilarity to our spectating spouses (and other onlookers apparently) as we attempted to stand and look strong and competent before wobbling precariously, losing our balance completely and toppling into the sea! Then there were those days where the ocean had completely changed and the swell was stronger and the waves much higher. This enabled us to body board (alas not surf, I'm not that cool) and so join in the cries of delight of many when we were lucky enough to time it just right and be swept to the shore on the crest of a wave at a thrilling speed!

Since returning home I read an article that reminded me that whilst the sea can be a source of fun, thrills and pleasure, it can also be a source of danger and peril. The news item recounted how a

swimmer, who had got into difficulty off the Jurassic coast in Dorset, was rescued by the ingenuity, resourcefulness, bravery and selflessness of a group of onlookers. Throwing caution to the wind, and forgetting any requirements to be socially distanced, the fellow bathers formed a human chain to reach out, rescue and save the troubled swimmer from the treacherous waves. You may well have read the same story and like me thought 'praise God!'

This remarkable story of the heroic and brave beachgoers forming a human chain to rescue someone in grave danger is utterly inspiring. It illustrates that interconnectedness and teamwork in seeking to achieve what might seem impossible is of paramount importance. It demonstrates that unity and solidarity is crucial to the success of a mission. It reveals that focussed determination and unwavering resilience yields results. It embodies how deep compassion and selfless love literally saves lives.

As the 25th September approaches, the re-scheduled date for my ordination, I have been reflecting on the promises I will make during the service. One of those promises is '....to work with.....fellow members in searching out the poor and weak, the sick and lonely and those who are oppressed and powerless, reaching

into the forgotten corners of the world, that the love of God may be made visible.' I have been asking myself how I will fulfil this mission in my ministry in our benefice. As we emerge from the pandemic there are, and there will be, many living within our reach who will need rescuing from the overwhelming tidal wave of devastation caused by Covid 19. Social and economic hardship and mental and emotional anguish lie vulnerable and exposed like debris on a storm swept beach. In such a time as this there has never been more of a need to make the love of God visible.

Of course, as passionate as I am about this rescue mission, it is not just down to me. We are all called to join God in this. Through the power of the Holy Spirit, each of us is invited to link arms with one another and form a chain just like those brave rescuers on a Dorset beach. Our unity and solidarity will give us courage to reach out. Our consensual focus and determination will enable us to make a difference. Our interconnectedness will fuel our efforts to achieve what might seem impossible. Together, our Christ-like compassion and selfless acts of love will undoubtedly save lives, hearts and souls. Will you be a link in this chain?


Compline (online)


