Risk-taking - a reflection from Revd Canon Terry Joyce

One of the most fascinating conversations I had in my previous role a few years ago was with a senior member of staff at a prestigious University who was a Director of Risk Management. The ultimate responsibility of her department was to assess, explore and seek to minimise the implications of all the foreseen and unforeseen risks that could happen within the University context. The role was deemed so important it gave her open access to the Vice Chancellor and all the Senior Managers 24/7. I was fascinated. I had never met such a person. I didn't know you can get a degree in it. You need a good constitution for it, or you might never get out of bed in the morning. Bet she's been busy recently?

There was a time, a good few years ago, when the 18 biggest Hospital A & E Depts (then called Casualty) kept meticulous records of the cause of domestic accidents. I was given an annual report from one and was surprised by some of the items listed. I actually framed an All Age Service around it, dressing up in overalls, with industrial gloves, eye protection, a hard hat and slowly and from a bag with danger symbols on it, carefully revealing, one by one, slippers, socks, cheese, sandwiches, pens and

pencils. Surprisingly, things that you would regards as dangerous, sharp things or bleach, were way down the list.

Since then, I've discovered that it's several times less risky for your child to walk to school than it is to take them in a car. In fact, the biggest danger to children walking to school is people in cars taking their kids to school. It's well known that you are more likely to be knocked over on the way to buying your lottery ticket than to win the jackpot. The classic comedian, Dave Allen, used to say that since one third of accidents were caused by drunkdrivers, this led to the conclusion that two -thirds of accidents were caused by the sober who should get off the road and leave the drunks in peace! It does get crazy.

Risk assessment is currently a hot topic. In current circumstances, they have had to be done by each church in our benefice in anticipation of every proposed service or meeting. We ask questions such as 'How likely is the risk to happen? How serious would the consequences be? We all embrace a certain level of risk in our lives, but we have to avoid any possibility of risks with serious consequences and think about how to reduce minor risks. All of

this is now a part of our lives. It's not always easy. It took ages for the experts to decide that wearing masks was beneficial.



In contrast, living as a Christian is a risk! The Bible is a book of risk. If a risk assessment were done on it, there would have to be loads redacted. It would end up being more of a pamphlet! There's been many occasions when, leading a service, I've read a Collect (the Church's special prayer for the day) and I've been tempted to add before the Amen, "Are you sure you want to say Amen to that?" How about "mercifully grant that your Holy Spirit may in all things direct and rule our hearts" or "O Lord, raise up, we pray, your power and come among us and with great might succour us". Are we sure? And what about hymns - 'Come down O love divine' – the desire that God would visit his people in person. Are we really ready for that?

Think about what we are saying and doing in worship. Faith is a risk – it's part of its definition. We're called to be risk takers – Jesus taught us that!
