A Harvest Reflection - from Judith Hewitt

It's another Harvest Festival When we bring our fruit and vegetables Cause we want to share the best of all The good things that we've been given.

These are the words from the Harvest Samba that we would be singing when the children from Dunnington Primary School come to celebrate Harvest in St Nicholas Church. But like other celebrations this will not be happening this year.

Harvest Festivals have taken place, in various forms, since we read these words in Genesis, 'While the earth remains, seedtime and harvest, cold and heat, summer and winter, day and night, shall not cease.'

Harvest Festivals occur all around the world at various times usually to coincide with the conclusion of the harvest of crops, and would often include a meal of some kind as part of the celebration.

An early harvest festival was celebrated at the beginning of the harvest season on 1st August and was called Lammas, meaning 'loaf Mass'. Farmers would make loaves of bread from the fresh wheat crop and give them to the local church as the Communion bread to be used during a special service to thank God for the harvest. Harvest in Britain tends to take place at the end of the harvest and when we first came to Dunnington there was a Harvest Service on Thursday evening when the local farmers would join us to give thanks.

Harvest Festivals have changed over the years. We no longer have our Churches full of produce from our gardens. I wonder who remembers cleaning carrots, parsnips etc and putting them in a decorated shoe box to take to harvest. Today we tend to ask for gifts that can be used by Carecent, but this year their needs have changed (details on the reverse of this newsletter and in the October Grapevine).

In recent years Harvest has been linked with an awareness of and a concern for other people, particularly those in the developing world where they rely so much on the weather and other conditions so their crops will grow and produce the food they need to survive.

We might feel this year we haven't much to thank God for at harvest time, but just look around you, we have so much to be thankful for.

Some also say Harvest Festival is not a Christian, or religious festival, but if we look back to the roots of our Christian faith we can see from early times the Jewish year was punctuated by festivals, with some of them coinciding with the changing seasons, reminding them of God's constant provision for them.





They were occasions of joy and celebration reflecting on all the good things that God had given and done for his people.

So let this weekend be an occasion when we thank God for his goodness to each one of us, giving thanks not just for the food we have to eat, but also for our warm homes, for a safe place to lay our heads each night and for people to care for us, and let us not forget the spiritual food which has sustained us and will continue to sustain as we enter the uncertain days ahead.
