Watching and waiting

a reflection by Revd Nick Bird

Patience is a virtue, but not a gift received by all. Patience was once the fruit of boredom, however boredom is rare these days. TV is available 24/7 (even though for 20 of those it will be absolute cobblers),



films can be streamed, books downloaded, and mobile phones make everyone contactable at any time in any place. So to have to wait for anything at all is a diminishing experience and decreasing skill.

Christmas brings the potential for such a gift. Advent is a season of watching and waiting. Presents under the tree (or on top of the wardrobe) act like putting a treat in front of a puppy, as a child is told, 'You'll just have to wait until Christmas'. This waiting, although difficult, especially if it for the gift of longmissed family to arrive and celebrate, is always an opportunity, and a surprisingly good training in prayer.

We watch and wait for the gift of the Christ-child, but his coming is not related to our worthiness to receive him, our joy is not made greater by our goodness. In the same way that the Santa-myth of naughty-or-nice separates the deserving from the undeserving, God does not come to us in our prayers consummate with the degree of our purity or the fervour of our entreaties, but rather our capacity to receive him. If we are full, then there is no space, and if we are full of our own worthiness, then we will have no room in our inn.

There is a chasm of difference between purity and holiness. Purity is about being separated from that which is considered unclean – money, sex and power, the fun things mostly. Holiness is about being connected to – to each other and to the Divine. Sadly, we often prioritise purity and so suffer sterility of religious experience. So the watching and waiting, even in prayer, is never about making us worthy, but rather making us empty, and when empty, ready to receive the priceless gift that was first given at Christmas. Cleanliness might not be next to godliness, but boredom might just be next to holiness. Watch and wait and receive.
