



Snowdrops

Dear Friends,

As I stood at my kitchen window the other day, I saw something white among the green leaves. I went out to look and saw the bud of a snowdrop. It brought a smile to my face as, to me, it is one of the symbols of hope that we all need at the moment.

It also made me wonder about the symbolism of the snowdrop, so I turned to my computer. I read that, according to legend, the snowdrop first became a symbol of hope when Adam and Eve were expelled from the Garden of Eden. It is said that, when Eve was about to give up hope that the cold winters would never end, an angel appeared and transformed some of the snowflakes into snowdrops.



We are all feeling that this pandemic is never going to end, but there is hope, hope in the skill of the scientists who have produced the vaccines to fight Covid 19.

Snowdrops are also known as 'Candlemas bells' as they are one of the first flowers to bloom, signifying the arrival of Spring. Often the first time we see snowdrops is as the snow is melting.

Friends,

When writing my letter each month I'm inclined to keep things broad – not too religious, political, personal or fluffy. Whilst I am mindful that the Christian faith has

been a dominant force in shaping our laws, language and culture, it is not necessarily professed by all readers. Some denominational clergy roles are explicitly congregational chaplains, but a Church of England vicar is priest to the whole community, without exception — whether one is a joiner, Jewish or Jedi. It's a thing of wonder about the good old CofE, and so I try to write something that can be approached by all. So please excuse me whilst I rant about my loathing for politicised religion in America, and what that might have to say to us.

Over recent months and years we have seen in the U.S.A. what happens when politics and religion are mixed in partisan and divisive ways. White conservative evangelicalism has allied itself, or allowed itself to be hijacked, in ways that have amputated its own moral platform, and from which it may never recover. "Jesus, Jesus" they cry, as many of them have also chanted "Trump, Trump", and waved a bible around in the same way that one might place a full stop at the end of an argument. Maybe "Jesus" should never be the chant of the religious, but rather "justice, justice". I find it impossible to understand why the 'sanctity of life' argument seems not to extend to the Black Lives Matter movement, those on death row, or poor children without adequate health care provision.

Barbara Brown Taylor's words challenge me to the core through their simple truth. The bible says nothing of abortion or gay marriage or gun ownership (which is not to say that the scriptural tradition, of which we are all heirs – like it or not – does not speak into the full breadth of our contemporary concerns), or other matters that predominate in the culture wars of North America, however much some religious leaders spout that 'The bible teaches...' But the Good Book is replete with references to the requirement for justice and equity, concern for the vulnerable and the alien (read 'immigrant'), and care for our neighbour.

To be clear (and this is entirely the point of Jesus' story about the Good Samaritan – a phrase we still hear often in popular culture), our neighbour is not the person who lives in our street or our village, the person who looks and sounds like us. Our neighbour is anyone who needs us, and anyone whom we need.

So be suspicious of anyone who professes a faith that divides neighbours. In this time of covid-anxiety and social-distancing, neighbours are sacred, and neighbourliness is moral duty. This is not about partisan religiosity, or religion in particular. It is about being human on the side of good.



YORK MINSTER Parish Passes 2021

The Parish Pass entitles church members of parishes and benefices in the Diocese of York to visit York Minster and the Undercroft for sightseeing during normal opening hours.

In 2021, the Parish Pass scheme is going digital!

Due to the impact of Covid, in a change from previous years, those planning to visit York Minster need to *make a reservation in advance*, because the number of people visiting each day is strictly limited. You need to make a reservation for a specific date and time from the **www.yorkminster.org** website.

NB. When you visit you need to take proof of residency in the Diocese, a copy of the Parish Pass and your reservation.

"The Fallen" - Remembered

The Bomber Crash at Holtby (part 4). The seven RAF aircrew members who all died in this incident on 8 Sep 1942 were, like many others, brave young men flying in aircraft built only for a deadly purpose in war, and were exposed to lethal risk on every flight. Their homes were not in this village, but it was here they fell. The last three of the seven are named below.

One of two Wireless Operator/Air Gunners on board was 1256530 Sgt **Laurence George Harvey**, age 22. He was a Londoner, born on 8 Apr 1920 in Hackney, and apparently known as 'Laurie'. His parents were George Alfred Harvey, an electrical cable joiner in the Post Office engineer department, and Daisy Maude (Watts), a confectioner, who had married in South Hackney Church in 1919.

Laurie joined the RAF Volunteer Reserve, and sometime in 1940/41 enlisted for war service. His family chose to have the burial at Eastbrookend Cemetery in Dagenham, Essex, where his grave is marked by a private family headstone. One of Laurie's two siblings was Barbara Rosemary, who married John Clifford and died in 1993.

1182739 Flight Sgt **Ronald Leonard Stevens**, age 20, was another Wireless Operator/Air Gunner on bomber W1228. He was born in 1921 in the Lambeth district of London, to William Joseph Stevens and his wife Florence Maud (Huggins). About 1940/41, having joined the RAF Volunteer Reserve, he enlisted at Cardington for war service.

Ronald's parents were in Morden when he died, and his war grave is in Morden Cemetery. The epitaph chosen by his parents for the headstone reads: "He like others his life did give; the price of freedom that we might live."

The flight engineer on board W1228 was 536790 Sgt **John Taylor**, age 26. He seems to have been appointed a Class F Reservist for the RAF before war-time service, but I have so far been unsuccessful in tracing further details and family origin.

John's grave is in the war cemetery section of St Catherine's Churchyard at Barmby Moor.

Burial Policy - Holy Trinity, Stockton on the Forest

The burial policy for the above church has been updated by the Church Council after concerns raised about the limited remaining space.

'Coffin burials in the churchyard of Holy Trinity, Stockton on the Forest, will only be permitted for those who have a right of burial (a parishioner resident in the parish at the time of death; a person whose name is on the electoral roll of the parish at the time of death; a person who dies in the parish), and those who have received the explicit written permission of the Parochial Church Council. All requests for the burial of ashes will be accepted. Consent for a coffin burial for those who do not have a right of burial will not usually be given'.




Crisis point for Stockton on the Forest Village Hall!

Foil for Snappy raised over £2000 in 2020!

Overall in 2020 the Foil for Snappy recycling collection brought in an massive **5482kg** of metal recycling raising **£2152.04** for The Snappy Trust, who have been supporting disabled children and young adults in York throughout the pandemic. This was £1870.04 from the recycling itself and £282.00 in donations of scrap metal taken directly to L. Clancey & Sons at Murton.

For those who are interested the breakdown is as follows;

- Aluminium foil 2843kg, up 57% on 2019
- Aluminium drinks cans 1459kg, up 23%
- Steel cans 150kg, down 45% (this is great, they're not worth much and take up space)
- Household cables 343kg, up 27%, we did really well on broken Christmas tree lights
- Other metals and scrap 687kg

Huge thanks to everyone who has saved their aluminium foil, drinks cans and household cables for us. The collection will continue throughout 2021. Can we make this another record year for recycling?

The nearest outdoor collection bins are in the recycling areas at Deans Garden Centre, Sainsbury's and Asda Monks Cross. Some of the benefice churches also have collection points (but are closed during the current lockdown).

Both walkers and runners should indeed be thankful for the extensive network of local footpaths and bridleways they have inherited from the past to enable them to enjoy the physical and mental health benefits of fresh air and local exercise in the nearby countryside, whilst following the Countryside Code and now all the social distancing rules. We look forward to happier times when even more enjoyment can be possible for both young and old.

Some enthusiasts have been exploring new hobbies in their own gardens. One couple used macro-photography to take beautiful pictures of frost covered leaves and flower heads. Dunnington Parish Council Access to Hagg Wood

Further to our article in the December 2019 issue regarding the closure of the track from Intake Lane into Hagg Wood some progress has been made in respect of this matter albeit slowly. If you do not already know two applications were made in 1997 seeking to record two separate public footpaths from Intake Lane into Hagg Wood one of which relates to the track.

Both these applications were the subject of an initial public consultation in the Autumn of 2019 and the City of York Council concluded that there was sufficient evidence for both applications to be determined as public footpaths and Orders were made on 24 February 2020 for these to be effective on 10 February 2020. A further public consultation was subsequently held in the Spring of 2020. However due to a number of continuing objections these Orders could not be implemented and the City of York Council referred the matters to the Secretary of State (Planning Inspectorate) in late Summer last year for them to deal with. In the meantime the track is likely to remain closed.

City of York Council has indicated that it is likely both cases will go to inquiry. At the moment the Planning Inspectorate appear to be trying to hold these inquiries during the Summer for covid reasons. Inquiries have to work to a set timetable which is usually around 26 weeks. This means that the Planning Inspectorate need to set the timetable by the end of March 2021 to hold an inquiry before the end of September 2021. If they do not get these matters under way by then, in a worst case scenario, it could be that the inquiries will not take place until Summer 2022. However if the covid vaccine is effective and the majority of people have been vaccinated towards the end of this year the situation may change and face to face inquiries should be possible. Alternatively the inquiries could be held during peak virus time if all the parties were willing to take part in a virtual inquiry. Unfortunately, as you can see, there is a certain amount of speculation as to what will actually happen which does not help matters. In addition, to complicate the situation even further, the Planning Inspectorate also has a large volume of cases to deal with so for the time being it is a matter of watch this space. As yet the City of York Council has not heard from them.

Whilst both these cases are in Kexby and Scoreby Parish because the majority of people who access Hagg Wood do so from our Parish it is considered that this information is in our residents public interest. This article is factual and based on information that is in the public domain.

Intake Lane

As many of you will have seen various work has been undertaken along the single section carriageway of Intake Lane in an effort to combat the indiscriminate parking that takes place and has done so for a number of years. It has been a challenge to say the least to get to this stage as the Lane is very popular, especially for walkers and cyclists, and everyone's requirements have had to be taken into account including the residents, land owners and farmers. Deliveries need to be made, dustbins emptied, fuel delivered and it is essential that access is maintained including the existing rights of way and the national cycle track. There have been times when the police have had to get involved and the emergency services have raised concerns about not being able to access the full length of the Lane. On occasions both residents and farmers have not been able to access their homes and fields whilst going about their normal everyday business and some have been verbally abused. I am sure you will agree this is a most unsatisfactory state of affairs.

As a consequence the Parish Council has been working with the City of York Council, and Ward Councillors, to come up with a sensitive solution that will go someway towards addressing the matter in a rural environment although it is accepted that whilst ever the Lane is used for all these many activities the work that has been undertaken, using Ward funding, will not solve the problem completely. Details of the work that has been agreed with the City of York Council can be found on the Parish Council website. In addition a "no waiting at any time" restriction on the grass verges outside the residents homes has been approved by the City of York Council which makes it an offence to park there. The police have already recently issued tickets further down the Lane for people who have parked inconsiderately. The opportunity has also been taken to plant cowslips, spring bulbs and sow wild flower seeds along the verges in and around the new fencing which should provide a good show later this year.

Now that this work has been completed the situation will be kept under review before deciding whether it is necessary to take any further action. In the meantime please be aware that there is, and always has been, a very limited amount of parking space available at the end of the Lane so please only use it if it is absolutely necessary to do so.

For those of you who are familiar with and use the Lane, which is adopted and maintained by the City of York Council as far as the bridge over the drain, it is in an awful state of repair and needs some serious work to address the problem. The Parish Council and Ward Councillors are now pursuing this matter with the City of York Council although we suspect it will not be a quick win.

If anyone has any suggestions to further improve the experience of using this part of the Lane for the benefit of everyone please let the Parish Council know so that the matter can be considered.

A charming little wood through Warthill leads to Brockfield Hall For a shorter version of this walk, simply start at Holtby Church.

From the Cross Keys, go north-east along Petercroft Lane, and at the end cross Hollv Tree Lane. Go along the path, through 2 gates, and left round the hedge.


Go up to Eastfield lane and turn right. After ½ mile, as the tarmac road bends left, the map shows a path straight on to an oak tree, then across the A166 and through the Rectory field to Holtby Church. But as the Rectory is muddy at this time of year, instead of following the oak tree, veer left up the slope of Eastfield Lane, cross the A166, and turn down Panman lane to Holtby and its church. Go down past the church and take the right fork to Warthill.


After ½ mile go through Warthill, passing the Agar Arms and St Mary's Church.

Some 400m after the Agar Arms, as the road bears right, take a signposted path to the left between houses and over a bridge into a field. Go diagonally left, to a stile opposite, and cross to the corner of the next field. Negotiate the muddy stile area and bear left along a farm track for 300m. Turn right into the calm atmosphere of Brecks **Wood**: a guiet little wood of mainly deciduous trees.

As you emerge, turn left into Carrbank Lane, coming from Stockton. Follow this for ½ mile, past Brockfield Hall, an early 19th century country house built for the Agar family, open to the public in August. Turn right into Ruddcarr Lane and after 300m turn left towards Mount Pleasant Farm. Just before the farm take a gap in the hedge on the right, and turn immediately left. Skirt the house and follow the hedge to a rough stile Slant left across another field towards Weir Pond House. Come out on to Holtby Lane, with Weir Pond on the right, turn left and just before the junction take a path to the right, behind the houses.

Walk 300m up to Back Lane and turn right. After 200m veer left by a bench, through a gate and along the hedge for 150m to another gate on the left. Go through the newlyplanted Holtby Wood, cross the A166, up the bank and round the edge of the golf course. At the bottom, turn right into Eastfield Lane, and after ½ mile turn left down Garden Flats Lane then right, back along Petercroft Lane to the Cross Keys.

Our Wildlife Community – National Nestbox Week

Every February there's a special week called National Nestbox Week. It is around the 14th of February because the nesting season for many birds begins about that time.



We have been taking part in it for a few years now. In 2016, we put together a single nestbox (see photo) and in 2017 we bought a terrace nestbox for our sparrows. A blue tit used it instead! We have also put up other boxes including a larger one for our starlings. This year we are making two nestboxes: one with a hole for sparrows or tits, and an open-fronted box for robins or wrens.

In January some great tits were already investigating the 2016 nestbox. We're looking forward to putting up the new ones by our native hedge.

If you'd like to join in, you can buy kits for making boxes and ready-made boxes from the National Trust and CJ Wildlife. The RSPB also has a range of ready-made boxes. The BTO has lots of advice on types of boxes and where to place them https://www.bto.org/how-you-can-help/providing-birds/putting-nest-boxes-birds.

One of the knock-on effects of the recent rush of crises – climate, pollution, physical and mental health, economic, pandemic – has been a determination to **build back better**.

of which an important element is *build back greener*. One way to do this is to plant a large numbers of trees - witness the York Community Woodland of 50,000 trees planned for an area just outside York's northern ring road.

We are increasingly aware of the practical benefits which trees bestow on us: converting into life-giving oxygen the large amounts of carbon dioxide we pump into the atmosphere; producing timber for building, tools and paper pulp; holding back flood water; supplying food for us and for wildlife; supplying the basis for many medicinal products; and providing an environment for relaxation, exercise and entertainment, as dog walkers well know.

Less well known are some recently discovered benefits: houses within sight of trees are reckoned to be worth 7% more than the average; views of trees from the windows of houses or hospitals contribute to the rate of recovery of patients; and trees give off enzymes which reduce infection levels and stress when we relax in woodland. Several health centres located in woodland now offer this *forest* bathing as a very enjoyable therapy.

If this were not enough, trees also have a special relationship with us. More in the next issue of the Grapevine.



Garden BirdWatch

WHO FEEDS GARDEN BIRDS?

Answer - two thirds of us!

Oh, and we spend upwards of £600m doing so.

I'm not alone in having watched the birds in my garden more this last few months than ever before. Having stopped putting out supplementary food during the summer, it was a few weeks before they forgave me this lack of attention and came back in numbers – but they certainly have. You don't have to put out food to have birds around, but you certainly see more if you do, and it's well worth varying what you put out to see which is their favourite. It's suet balls in this restaurant!

Our garden is on the edge of York and normally welcomes around a dozen species each week in winter, according to my Garden BirdWatch records. The last few weeks though, it's been more like 15 or 16



What has been thrilling me recently though, is the number of flocks around. Are there more this year or am I looking more closely and more often? I've had mixed finch flocks, mixed tit flocks and even Robins and Dunnocks have been present in twos and threes — not at all usual. Mind you, birds don't often read bird books and don't always realise how they are supposed to behave.

My mantra has long been "the more you look, the more you see" and this includes studying the interactions within and between species, and the different feeding strategies they use. New to me this year has been watching Nuthatches. There are two around, though I don't think they are a pair, as one is very dominant, and they are never on the feeders together. If the dominant one is there, the other one pops onto a nearby bush and waits its turn. That said, they both send off any intruders of a different species, and given those beaks, who's going to argue?

They are persistent cachers too. They just never stop going back and forth, and can be seen hiding black sunflower seeds under stones on the path, in the flower beds and in all sorts of nooks. I fear a sunflower explosion this summer, and I know who is going to be expected to pull them all up. A pair of Coal Tits is also busy caching, though not quite as frenetically.

Usually, we have only one Robin around, but this year there are at least three and they can be seen swinging their handbags at each other, often with a third standing nearby watching proceedings. Robins have winter territories and will defend them robustly. Dunnocks, also usually

solitary, are hopping around under and on Looking out for bird the feeders in twos and threes, though I've yet to see much unruly behaviour. I guess they could be young siblings.



Another difference in feeding strategy to look out for is that of Blue Tits which usually take seeds away to eat, whilst Great Tits may do so too or may eat in situ. Conversely, Finches when solitary or in pairs will sit and scrunch seeds for several minutes. O.K., things are different when a flock arrives; then it's all about competition. Look more closely at finches feeding though, and you'll see some of them, Bullfinches especially, roll the seeds in their beaks to remove the skin, even with sunflower hearts.

About the only birds which feed amicably as a flock are Long Tailed Tits, and I've seen 6 or 8 spend several minutes on suet balls all together.


