Catching up

A reflection by Revd Keith Albans

As I write, the prospect of life continuing to re-open after lockdown is still on course, with further announcements being planned for mid-May, albeit with a stated intention of following 'data not dates'. As we do, one thing I've heard people say they're looking forward to is 'catching up'. After all it's been so long and, although there have been so many things we haven't done, catching up on news (or even gossip) is an understandable wish!

But I've also heard the phrase 'catching up' used in a context which makes me more anxious – namely when it is used about children who've missed out on schooling. Don't get me wrong, the burden borne by the youngest in our communities is real and evident, and has impacted some far more than others, but simply making a whole generation feel as though they've got a massive hill to climb, in order to fit a pre-pandemic model of where they ought to be, seems to me to add insult to injury. It also fails to acknowledge or value the things that have been done, borne or experienced while normal life was suspended.

In long-distance races it's not unknown for someone who has fallen early on, and been left far behind, to regather themselves, catch up and go on to win. They always say the secret is not to panic, take your time and do it gradually. Likewise, in the Tour de France, a competitor acquiring a puncture can have their wheel changed and re-join the peloton. Their secret is not to do it alone, but to make use of the help of team-mates.

Whatever stage of life we are at, we will all have been marked by the COVID-19 virus. For some, those marks will be very deep wounds – physical, psychological or financial – whilst for others they will be far less severe. The same widely differing outcomes will be true of the groups and institutions which make up our society – and the Church is not immune from this. As we begin to pick up the pieces and 'catch up', measuring everything against 'how it was' simply sets us all up to fail. And while we will not all have learnt how to make sourdough bread, write a novel or even master Zoom, sharing and honouring the things we have experienced is surely a better form of catching up – done slowly and with the help of one another.

I am a mermaid

Friends,

Like many people this past year I have been predominantly working from home. I have an office in the Rectory, so this isn't entirely new, and my daily commute is about 15 seconds, so nothing to complain about. But with the national lockdown, many meetings have become Zoom meetings, and, also like many people, my work attire is....variable.

Zoom, the online video conferencing platform, gives one the ability to be present, whilst not being entirely 'in the room'. From the waist up, the visible parts, I am usually well presented and am able to appear mostly human. From below the waste there is something vaguely fishy and it's best not to inspect things too closely. Conclusion, I am a mermaid; highly adapted to this peculiar environment, magical in perception, and more rarely sighted during an international pandemic. Like a siren calling people, not on to, but rather away from rocks, I am beautiful, but only in parts.

These modern ways of communicating are both marvellous and draining, but also give you the opportunity to present only the parts that one deems acceptable, and the ability to curate one's appearance. It now only takes half the effort to still look 100% presentable. Dog collar and lounge pants are the order of the day, and I need to remember not to go shopping (on those rare occasions) in slippers. But now I wonder how often this is true for us all, even in normal times. We are incredibly judgemental, and largely toward ourselves, as to what is and isn't acceptable. Even when it's not about our physical appearance, we hide that which we fear might shame us or embarrass, and cover up our quirks and oddities. Few are unabashed about putting themselves on full display – and I'm thinking more personality than physicality at this point. When adults act in ways that are not constrained by social convention or crippled by self-consciousness, we might call them childish or even eccentric. But why do we not simply name them as being 'free'.

Most of us are bound by the need to be a social average, to sit in the acceptable centre and not to stand out. To be eccentric is, by definition, to sit outside the centre, and, considering we are all unique and somewhere on the great spectrum of special, why do we fear to be ourselves in the company of others? Why are we so concerned to present a version of ourselves, a false-self, to not be present ourselves?

So, for now, I am going to enjoy being a mermaid. Alluring when in vision, and mysterious when out of sight. And I'm going to commit myself to the contemplative practice, not to be super spiritual as that's never going to happen. But rather to stare honestly and without judgement at what is, and to receive the gaze of the Divine Lover who sees our quirks, celebrates our differences, and who knows that those leggings don't go with that hoodie, but doesn't care, because the outer appearance is of far less concern than the inner life where true beauty can be found.



News from York Diocese

Diocesan Synod met online on 17 April. Among other matters discussed were:

- The 2018 Church of England's report '**Setting God's People Free**' (SGPF) which urges churches to empower and encourage every member in declaring and living out their practical Christian faith from Monday to Saturday each week as well as in church on Sunday.
- the '**Faith at Home**' campaign, which supports the faith development and pastoral care of children and young people alongside and together with our work in schools and churches.
- The '**Living Christ's Story**' programme, including the projects:
 - * **Multiply**; building new worshipping communities amongst those in their 20s, 30s and 40s
