

A reflection by Judith Hewitt

Dear Friends,

I wonder how many times you have said 'I'm looking forward to......' in the last eighteen months or so. I would like to suggest it would be many times. I would also suggest there will be a huge number of things that we are all looking forward to.



But what about today and what might happen during it and what we might do in it and who might we meet?

Each day is a gift from God, and He wants that day to be special, to be a day to remember, a day with something in it to say 'thank you' for.

Not all days are days we want to remember, but there will still be something in it to give thanks for. It maybe helpful to think back over a difficult day and to recall something you are grateful for; however small it may be, then to remember how you felt and to offer it to God.

Yes, we are looking forward, because there is so much we are looking forward to, those activities we were, or want to be involved in, those places we want to visit and to have more time to share with others, but make the most of this day and every new day as it comes.

A hymn many of you will be familiar with is 'New every morning is the love', with the last lines being 'and help us this and every day, to live more nearly as we pray.'

John Gotti [the mob boss] had a great line... He said: 'I became everything I wanted to become - how about you?'

Friends,

Call me lazy, but being a mobster and extortionist seems like a huge amount of work, unsocial hours, untrustworthy colleagues and the constant nagging stress of knowing you might be 'whacked' at any time. It must be a lifestyle choice as much as a chosen profession – perhaps it's the suits! And what about job satisfaction? Gotti was reported to earn

millions of dollars, and yet died ten years into a whole life sentence for multiple murders. Maybe he didn't do it for the money.

An article in the Guardian a few years ago made this report:

Want to be happy in your work? Go to theological college and avoid a career pulling pints. That would seem to be one conclusion to draw from a new study into wellbeing and public policy, which found that employees reporting greatest job satisfaction were vicars, while publicans — who on average earn almost £5,000 a year more — were the least happy in their work.

See, I knew I was doing the most privileged job in the world. But I am fascinated by Gotti's quote; 'I became everything I wanted to become – how about you?' This lays down an immense challenge, not least from someone who became something that many of us would not admire. Would you be able to respond in the affirmative?

Twenty years ago, as a young couple, Diane and I moved from the bright lights of Birmingham to the small, but perfectly formed, city of York. I took a part time Staff Nurse job at the LGI, and Diane was employed as a Community Development Worker in Foxwood, York, also part time. We purposefully bought a smaller house to keep our costs low (at the time choosing not to take on a massive £80,000 mortgage, but a rather more modest one of £60,000 – those were the days). The point being that we decided what we wanted to achieve professionally, personally, and in bricks and mortar, downshifting in order to accomplish a lifestyle, modest in ambition and freeing in practice, and it worked well. In effect, we had the fortune to become everything we wanted to become, without the fortune.

Ordination was an obedient response rather than a career ambition, and I believe that although it doubled my working week, the shared job satisfaction of ministers is because of the privilege we experience of walking alongside people, sharing burdens, engaging in a hugely varied work life (no two days are ever the same by a long shot), and having the freedom to manage our own diaries.

Maybe, just maybe, it's less about our great achievements, but, rather, what we set out to achieve in the first place. If my ambition is to conquer the mountain, then there is a reasonable chance that I'll fail. But if my ambition is to enjoy the climb, the views, the company, the freedom, then I shall likely succeed. Is it too challenging a question to ask 'What do I want to become?' (even in old age), or do we let the river of life carry us downstream and await to discover which shore we are washed up on? Or is the ambition to enjoy the wild ride that life provides, welcoming all that comes to us?

I would love to live like a river flows, carried by the surprise of its own unfolding

Tower Room Re-Roofing and New Heating System

"Renew, Restore, Rejuvenate"

A huge THANK YOU to everyone who has already donated to our fund to replace the Tower Room roof and install a new heating system. We have received, or been pledged, nearly £30k already, which is a tremendous start to our fund raising!

Undertaking this work is so important for ensuring the church buildings can be used by the whole Dunnington community well into the future. There are already a wide range of users, such as the 'Little People' toddler group, the 'Fun, Food and Fellowship' events, the art and sewing groups, and the yoga classes. Maybe you've relaxed in the Tower Room before now **enjoying an evening of beer and hymns, a ladies' cheese and wine event, or toasting the haggis on Burns' night?** Or enjoyed a quick cuppa in between the school infants' and juniors' Christmas, Easter or Harvest services, or a glass of mulled wine and a mince pie following a service of carols by candlelight?

We have a vision for developing the use of this valuable space even further, particularly as a place to meet people and get support, both of which are so crucial as we emerge from the pandemic. Ideas are developing on hosting a bereavement café; having an annual fair of organisations who provide services to the village; and offering support for local carers and those with dementia.

While there is some way to go in obtaining the necessary funds, progress is being made on developing the plans for the roof replacement, which is the first phase of the project. Our church architect has drafted the specification, which is now enabling us to apply for planning permission. Inevitably, being a listed building of historic importance to Dunnington means that the processes are complex.

If you can make a financial donation to help us take the project forward, we would be enormously grateful. Cash or cheques (made payable to Dunnington PCC) can be put through the Rectory Letterbox (Church Street) or via your normal church contacts. Please mark the envelope with "fabric donation". If you can gift-aid your donations this would be appreciated as this will enable us in addition to claim some tax back. Gift-aid envelopes are available in the church or from the Church Wardens, or you can download a gift-aid declaration from the webpage below.

The Methodist Church Council met after Easter to discuss how we might respond to a shortage of those able and willing to hold office, a decreasing number of members and the effects of 15 months of lockdown. After a wide-ranging discussion we reached the conclusion that carrying on in our current form is not possible and that we must therefore seek permission to begin the process of likely closure. Conversations have begun with our ecumenical partners and we have committed



ourselves to find ways of maintaining a Methodist witness within the Village. This has been a very difficult decision for everyone involved, as well as for the wider community, and it is one which has been passed to the Circuit and District for their consideration and support.

"The Fallen" - Remembered

German aircraft crash at Dunnington Lodge Farm (part 2). Near the farmhouse there is a small wayside memorial with a wooden cross. An inscription beside it carries the names of those who lost their lives in the incident. Another refers to a remarkable story, outlined in the York Press by Richard Harris in 2008.

In 1944 a Lancaster bomber from RAF Wickenby, returning from a mission over Berlin, was shot down by a Messerschmitt 110 fighter. The crew bailed out, the last being the navigator Arthur Lee whose parachute opened just in time to land him in a wood near Katzenelnbogen, 20 miles southeast of Koblenz. The rest of his crew were all killed. Angry local people rushed to the site, apparently intent on lynching the young British airman. A German soldier confronted the crowd at gunpoint, insisting that the airman be released and given medical treatment. Arthur's life was saved, though the soldier, Rudi Balzer, was later court-martialled.

About 45 years later, the airman and the soldier met again at the crash site – where, after the war, Herr Balzer had created a memorial with a mahogany cross, and six smaller crosses alongside to commemorate the dead aircrew. Other veterans were with them, and together they decided to find in Britain the site where the last German aircraft was brought down - for a like memorial.

This was the Ju88 nightfighter crash site at Dunnington Lodge Farm, where three of the Moll family were fatally injured and the German aircrew were all killed. A memorial was erected in 1989, after which British and German veterans began visiting this and the Katzenelnbogen sites in alternate years.

Since then, both Arthur Lee and Rudi Balzer have died; but their friendship and shared respect for the memory of 'The Fallen' had set an example. The reciprocal visits continue – under the joint patronage of the Doncaster Air Gunners Association and the German Nightfighters Association. In Britain, the event includes an associated visit to the Yorkshire Air Museum at the nearby former RAF Elvington airfield.
