What does loving God look like? by Revd Canon Nick Bird

Beware of those who are sticklers for the rules. The parable of the Good Samaritan disturbs our religious preoccupations, both liturgical and doctrinal. It is a stark warning to, and against, clergy and the pious laity.

It is worth noticing that, in response to the question 'What must I do to inherit eternal life?', the correct answers, given by this testing lawyer, are all about love. And further, Jesus does not say that one must believe this (loving God with heart, mind, soul and strength), but do it.

The thing about the priest and Levite is that they are doing the right thing, they are above reproach. They leave Jerusalem and head toward Jericho, ritually clean, undoubtedly after a faithful time serving in the temple, having worshipped their socks off. They are respected members of Jewish society, and they are following the rules. Both in turn come across a blooded man, quite possibly dead, stripped of his clothing, identity, dignity, and perhaps his life. To touch, or even come too close, would be to become ritually unclean, which would mean turning around and heading back to Jerusalem to undergo the rites of cleansing. Of course they shouldn't stop and approach! Of course they would not have been criticised for walking on by on the other side of the road. This is what they believed and what they knew, and what their teachers would have told them to do, and so they did nothing.

The Samaritan who followed them was not constrained by such rules, and he did not need to be a stickler for them. He didn't know whether this person was Jew or Gentile, Samaritan or other – what he saw was someone in need, and he responded with compassion and action. All that worship at the temple had not touched the hearts of the priest or Levite. Does it touch ours?

I think the older I get, the more I understand that it is about compassion – the Christian life in general, and church ministry in particular. What am I called to do as a priest? To love God and my neighbour, focussed in a very particular geographical area. But compassion, as with the Samaritan, leads us into right action, it is our guide and motivator. My job over the past 13 years serving in these parishes has primarily been to love the people to whom I've been sent, and in many ways I'm only just learning the depths of this, and know I have failed many times.

So when in doubt, maybe we should simply be asking ourselves,'Is this the compassionate and merciful thing to do?' And, if it is, then we should probably do it, and quickly. Action motivated by compassion will nearly always be the right thing to do, even if some may think it wrong. And, at the end of the day, I am much more likely to be able to rest easy with myself, be at peace in my soul, or defend my actions with confidence, if I can honestly say that I acted out of love, pity and compassion, than if, in my uncertainty or by conviction, I walked by on the other side. This, I believe, is what loving God looks like.
