# Reflection on John 20.24-29 by Revd Mark Poole



Today we commemorate the feast of St Thomas the Apostle. Seventeenth-century artist Carvaggio captures most strikingly the moment when Thomas declares his faith in the risen Christ. I find the painting enthralling. In the glowing candlelight, Christ grasps the wrist of Thomas who is stooped before him and guides Thomas' finger to the wound on his side beneath his garment. Thomas' brow is deeply furrowed as he peers into Jesus' side and traces the loose flesh of the gaping wound. Carvaggio skilfully creates the sense of just how profound this moment is in the life and faith of Thomas. It is as though Christ is opening himself to Thomas. In one sense it is uncomfortably intimate causing me to feel like I am interrupting a moment of profound compassion and love that should only be shared by Thomas and God. Yet on the other hand, I cannot avert my gaze. I'm drawn into the power of the encounter.

Jesus addresses Thomas, "Do not doubt but believe." Thomas has to make a decision, as there before his eyes, is the evidence. God the Almighty, the maker of heaven and earth who was crucified, died, and was buried is now risen, victorious over death and makes himself known to Thomas. Thomas responds from the depths of his soul, "My Lord and my God." With these words Thomas declares his faith in the risen Christ and acknowledges his claim upon his life to go forth and proclaim the good news of the resurrected Christ. Over the centuries Thomas has received a bad press. His name is synonymous with doubt and a lack of faith, and this reputation lives on. But I think this does Thomas a great disservice. Rather, Thomas has left an abiding and positive legacy to all who would follow the risen Christ. In many ways Thomas represents us all. If we are honest, we have all experienced doubt at times and struggled to believe, not least when life seems so unbearably cruel, and where God feels distant or even absent. The story of Thomas gives us reason to have hope. This story testifies that in these times of darkness, struggle, doubt and fear, Jesus Christ opens Himself to us, draws us into encounter with Him and says to us intimately and with compassion, "Do not doubt but believe."


